Research

TSET has research grants to the Oklahoma Center for Adult Stem Cell Research, Oklahoma Tobacco Research Center and the Stephenson Cancer Center, which treats patients statewide. TSET's research grants advance new discoveries, add to the knowledge base and provide hope.

Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline Participants

The Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline provides free telephone and web-based tobacco cessation "coaching" sessions and free nicotine patches, gum and lozenges. Since 2003, the Helpline has served more than 300,000 Oklahomans, saving an estimated \$18 million each year in direct medical costs from tobacco users who have quit with the Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline.

Statewide Grants

TSET provides grants to communities and health systems to prevent and reduce tobacco use and obesity. Grantees submit annual budgets and work plans. In some cases, grantees are able to leverage federal dollars through the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to expand reach and impact. TSET funds about 40 to 50 percent of the total program cost for health systems grants.
